TRUK STATE FIRST TO ACCEPT COMPACT

Urges sister states to follow

KOIONIA, Pohnpei—Truk State Legislature became the first legislature to accept the amendments made to the Compact of free association by U.S. Congress, according to Truk Gov. Erhart Aten's Jan. 24 telex to President Tosiwo Nakayama, Speaker Bethwel Henry, four State Governors and Legislature Speakers.

Aten said the Truk Legislature, on behalf of the people of the State of Truk, adopted on Jan. 24 a resolution accepting the Compact of Free Association with the changes proposed by the U.S. Congress.

He said the Truk Legislature action came after considering all alternatives given during a set of briefings held before the state government officials, legislative and traditional leaders as well as the people of Truk by the FSM Status Commission Jan. 21-24 and finding that there is no other option aside from the present compact of Free Association.

Shortly after the briefings on Jan. 24, a special session of the legislature was called by Speaker Sindon Innocenti at the urging of the state senators so to document their official approval of the Compact and its amendments, Aten added.

"We in Truk believe that it is

Chiefs endorse Compact, `end trust!'

LELU, Kosrae—The FSM President and governors adopted a resolution endorsing the findings and recommendations of the FSM Status Commission regarding changes to the Compact of Free Association by U.S. Congress and stating that the U.N. trusteeship agreement should be terminated without delay and urging the FSM state and national legislatures to complete their compact review before March 1, 1986, during the Jan. 13-17 Eight FSM Chief Executives' Conference in the State of Kosrae.

The FSM External Affairs Micro-

The FSM External Affairs Micronesian Relations Division Deputy Chief Gabriel Ayin, who coordinated the conference, said that the

chief executives also adopted a resolution endorsing the decision by the FSM Finance Secretary in trying to enter into a contract with Siebel Capital Management, Inc., of larkspur, California, as an investment counsel for the Federated Development Authority, which was established in an agreement on Internal Budget and Finance Procedures under the Compact for the investment of Compact money; also urged that the first meeting of the FDA should be held as soon as possible.

FSM President Tosiwo Nakayama notified the FSM officials in a

Luktun laid to rest on Jan. 16

COLONIA, Yap—The Yap State Legislature adopted Jan. 14 a resolution expressing on behalf of the entire state government sympathy and condolences to the family and friends of former Chief Magistrate and Public Affairs Department Political Affairs Division Chief Francisco Luktum, who died of heart attack Jan. 9 at the Yap Memorial Hospital at the age of 66, according to State Information Officer Henry Muthan.

Mr. Luktum, of Okaw. Weloy Mu-

nincipality, was a traditional leader serving as vice chairman of Council of Pilung (Paramount Chiefs) and President of Community Yap Action Program (Yap CAP) Board

of Directors and Chief Magistrate of Weloy Municipality has a long and distinguished career in pub-lic service which began in 1940 when he first served as a secretary to Welcy municipal govern-ment under the Japanere administration.

He attended the Japanese Vocational High School (MOKKO) in Palau, 1933-1936, 1950 summer Palau, 1933-1936, 1950 summer teacher training at PITTS, Moen, Truk, and as a UN Technical Assistance fellow, attended a sixmonth study in government opera-tions and procedures in Cook Is-lands, Fiji, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea and Australia, in 1970.

Luktun served as a classroom teacher at Bael Elementary School from 1947-1956 prior to being e-lected member of the former Yap Magistrate Council. From 1957-1960, he served as member of the Micronesian Advisory Council, to the T.T. High Commissioner, a fore-runner of the former Con-

gress of Micronesia.

He joined the Yap District Public Affiars Department in 1970 and was put incharge of planning and organization of information regarding government activities. He was a delegate representing the Yap Traditional leaders to the Micronesian Constitutional Convention in 1975, helped translated the Compact document to Yapese Language, participated in Micronesian Maritime Authority negotiations with Japanese Fishing Association and other numerous political affairs and State and National Leadership conferences, Muthan said.

The resolution states that Luktun was "a wise, dependable, con-scientious and well-respected political leader" whose stature and experience in public service con-tributed immensely to the effec-tive implementation of civic education programs in the state of

Luktum was buried on Jan. 16 and is survived by his widow, three sons and six daughters.

Dannis declared lost

KOIONIA, Pohnpei-Search rescue operations were called off Jan. 16 by Pohnpei State offi-cials and family of Carl Dannis who is believed lost at see during a fishing accident northeast of Kolonia harbor on Jan. 10.

Rescue and search efforts, involving M/s Micro Glory, 43-foot State Marine Resources boat, Yellowfin, PMA plane and two dozens boats, were called off after res-cuers located and confirmed on Jan. 14 a boat similar to Dannis' some 10 miles east of Pohnpei Is-

Joanes Peter, another fisherman whose boat was led by PMA plane to the broken boat, confirmed that the boat was Dannis' and that it had cracks in its hull and bow and was still capsized with no one on it.

When efforts to tow in the broken boat failed, a part of the rear seat was brought to Dannis' family who confirmed the positive identity of the boat as Dannis', sources close to the family said.

An official memorandum, Jan. 16, was released by Pohnpei State Marine Resources division calling off the search and rescue operations and thanking all who participated in the search efforts for Mr. Dannis.

tary of Finance to evaluate the monetization of funds under the Compact of Free Association and requesting the Federated Development Authority to weigh such monetization as an investment strategy.

No. 8-6 Requesting the President of the Federated States of Micronesia to organize or reorganize a committee to develop a Festival of Arts of the Federated States of Micronesia.

No. 8-7 Requesting the President of the Federated States of Micronesia to present a new proposal organizing the National Government's foreign investment function; requesting a meeting to review that proposal.

No. 8-8 Expressing the deepest appreciation of the Conference for the work done by the Federa-ted States of Micronesia staff and representatives in Washington, DC, in pursuit of passage of the Compact of Free Association.

No. 8-9 Requesting that the Congress of the Federated States of Micronesia meet with the Chief Executives to address the need to coordinate national project appropriations with the development plans of the States, and discuss the nationally-collected tax revennes.

No. 8-10 Adopting and encouraging the work of the Committee assigned the task of developing a retirement plan for the public servants of the State and National Governments.

The chief executives also set their next meeting to be held in

Pohnpei power crisis end seen

KOLONIA, Pohnpei-Pohnpei State Gov. Resio S. Moses said Jar. 23 in an interview that by February or March Pohnnei should be able to get over its power crisis with the purchase of an additional generator and to wait for the hookup of eight million watt Alco generators scheduled to arrive in August.

"If nothing changes our plan, Pohnpei will not only have full electric power, but there will be more than enough power from the eight million watts available from the Alco generators to go around the island by August, Moses said.

Moses declared power crisis on Dec. 26 following the breakdown of three generators in Nanpohnmal and one in Kolonia Power plant, and put the whole island on alternating power rationing on the remaining four generators.

Moses directed all government offices to turn off air conditioning units or keep them at the minimum level required if they are necessary for the maintenance of mainframe computers and other sensitive electronic equipment; also requesting all government, business and residential electricity customers to discontinue all non-essential uses of power, and private businesses which have their own generators to use them in the evening hours to reduce the unmanageable demand on the and Kolonia power plants.

Assuring Pohnpei electric power customers that the emergency measures are temporary and to be observed only until Pohnpei's electric power generating units are restored to their full capacity, Moses said, "Although it is anticipated that the repairs to all four generating units may be completed by the end of February, the age and condition State's current inventory of Caterpillar and White Superior generators, coupled with high consumer demand for electricity, indicate that the present power crisis will not in reality end until the new Alco power plant goes into operation."

Moses said until August when Alco power begins operating, he solicits active cooperation of all electricity consumers to be frugal in their use of electricity so it can meet the needs of the growing population on Pohnpei.

A reconditioned Caterpillar D-398 generator capable of producing 500 kilowatts into Pohnpei's power distribution system is ex-pected to arrive at the end of the month, Pohnpei State Commun-

Bermin ity Services Director Weilbacher said.

\$32,000 generator ordered from Tandem Equipment Company, Inc., of Seattle, Washington, is unable to be flown in by Air Micronesia because of its weight and dimension, Weilbacher said, addding, that the FSM National government has requested the U.S. Air Force through the Trust Territory government to airlift it into Kolonia at no cost - as a goodwill gesture to the people of Pohnpei during the power crisis.

Weilabacher said that President Work Nakayama received word on Jan. 27 from High Commissioner Janet Mc-Coy who said military has informed her that shipment of the gen- 9

erator can only be made on a rewindowsable and space available basis. And that from the estimates given, it will cost \$40,430 at \$3.11 per pound freight to fly the unit to Pohnpei.

"Since the military is unable to perform the request, then the generator will be sent here by ship in six weeks time," Weilbacher added.

Moses said of the four broken generators, a 500 KW D398 Cater-pillar has sustained major damage to its engine block; a 750 KW White Superior and another 800 KW D399 Caterpillar unit suffered crankshaft failures with another 500 KW D398 Caterpillar awaiting major repairs.

"Six generating units with an additional backup unit are needed to keep the island on full elec-tric power," Weilbacher said, adding that Pohnpei State has contracted Lloyd Durbin, a me-chanic specialized in power gen-

erating equipment from Tandem Equipment Company to do preventive maintenance and to evaluate, assess and present recommendations to the state on what to do in order to upgrade its present electricity situation.

Weilbacher said that as skilled repairmen continue to work on the units, four ALCO generators are being installed on a barge by Bellingham and Marine Propulsion, Inc., in Bellingham, State of

Washington and are scheduled to be towed to Pohnpei to be in-stalled in August as a floating power plant at Deketik Island near the Pohnpei International

Regents meet, approve \$1.5 million

KOLONIA, Ponape—The College of Micronesia (COM) Board of Regents authorized a spending freeze and a request to the three Micronesian governments to hold a summit. meeting on future college funding under the Compact of Free Association, during its annual meeting here Jan. 19-22, according to a COM news release.

COM Executive Director Singeru Singeo said that he will issue on Jan. 27 a directive to implement the expenditure freeze for the balance of the fiscal year due to the uncertainty of when the Compacts will go into effect for the FSM and the Marshall Islands and how they would effect funding for the college system.

"We are freezing everything except payrolls, food stuffs for the students, basic supplies and travel," essential Dr. Singeo

raid.

The Regents approved a \$5,022,-772 fiscal 1986 consolidated budget for the COM system which includes \$1.5 million from the annual U.S. Interior Department; \$1,993,888 from the U.S. Educa-tion Department in Basic Educa-tion Opportunity Grants, or socalled Pell grants; \$746,363 from U.S. Agriculture Department for the College of Tropical Agricul-ture and Science I and Grant pro-gram, and the balance from various categorical grants.

The DOI funds are scheduled to be terminated when the Compacts into effect and the Pell grants will continue only for those Micronesian students receiving them on the effective date of the Compacts, the release

"We hope the provision (in the Compact resolution) for transi-tion programs will include the Pell grants," Singeo said, noting that this would delay the end of the grants by three years which would "give us more leeway to look for funding."

The board directed that a letter be drafted for the signature of Rector Alfred Capelle of the Marshall Islands or Vice Rector Damian Sohl of Pohnpei to the Micronesian presidents and legislatures, asking them to name task forces to work with a COM task force in reviewing data on the population Micronesian student and COM needs and drafting recommendations to the proposed summit, according to Singeo, the release reported.

"The college is ready to provide whatever information the

governments need," he said.

Dr. William Kinder, who was contracted by COM to prepare a

master plan for the college system, told the board that he expects to complete a draft plan by the end of March to be presented to the Regents during their April 21-23 meeting in Palau.

The hoard also scheduled a ept. 22-24 meeting in Majuro to coincide with the opening of the new campus for the CCM Mursing School which will be moved from Saipan.

The board reelected Capelle, rector; Sohl, vice rector, and John Salas of Guam who represents Trust Territory, secretary-

It certified two new regents, Kathy Kesolei of Palau, replacing Bernard Helgenberger of Pohmpei as a Trust Territory representa-tive, and Singkichy George who replaces FSM Senator Claude Phillip as the Kosrae member.

Also attending the meeting were Regents Sebastian Anafel of Yap and Dr. Ansito Walter of Truk.

It granted "regent emeritus" status to the Rev. Billy Kuartei of Palau, who completed eight years on the board and served as the first COM rector; Helgenberger; Phillip, and the late Pohn-pei State It. Gov. Strik Yoma, an original board member who died in office in 1984.

The board desingated Salas as chairman of a Micronesian Occupa-College Presidential Search Committee to make recommendations in the April meeting for a replacement for Wilhelm Rengiil who resigned in December to become Palau's National Resources Minister.

The Rev. Mr. Kuartei was appointed interim MOC president, effective Feb. 1 until a replacement is named. MOC Dean of Instruction Francis Matsutaro has been serving as acting president.

The board authorized the executive director to contract Touche Ross and Associates to audit fiscal 1984 and 1985 accounts and to submit recommendations for investment management of the \$3 million Land Grant Endowment Fund in the April meeting.

It authorized the executive director to develop and implement job descriptions, salary ules and recruitment for CTAS scientific personnel and to en-gage a consultant to review and upgrade COM personnel regula-tions, pay scales and job descriptions.

The board directed the executive director and campus executives to develop and adopt standards for computer hardware and software purchases common to all campuses and purposes.

The Regents directed the vice rector to transmit a letter of appreciation on their behalf to the Pohnpei Public Lands Authority, Gov. Resio S. Moses and legislature Speaker Ambros Senda for the conveyance Jan. 20 of 30.1 hectares of Palikir land near the new FSM capitol site for a new CCM campus and agricultural re-

They also thanked the CCM administration and faculty for the Jan. 20 conveyance ceremony and reception at the Sunset View and extended their appreciation to former COM Executive Director Loren Peterson for continuing to

assist the college.

MOC is fully accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges and has about 100 full-time faculty and staff members serving some 400 students throughout Micronesia.

MOC Chief resigns takes cabinet post

KOĪONIA, Pohnpei—Micronesian Occupational College (MDC) President Wilhelm Rengiil has resigned to accept Palau President Iazarus Salii's appointment as Minister of National Resources, according to Rengiil's Jan. 7 memorandum to the FSM President Tosiwo Nakayama.

Rengiil, whose resignation took effect on Dec. 31, began as deputy director for the then Micronesian Occupational Center 1969 to 1972 and served as director from 1972 to 1978, became its President when Micronesian Occupational Center became a college in 1978.

In a response to Rengill's letter of resignation, College of Micronesia Rector Alfred Capelle of the Marshall Islands said that the COM Executive Director Sing-

eru Singeo would be going to MOC to facilitate a smooth transition until a selection of an interim president is made by the Board of Regents who were meeting in Pohnpei early part of January.

Singeo said the Regents have decided to hire former regent Rev. Billy Kuartei of Palau as interim president beginning Feb. 1 and designated Regent John Salas of Guam to head the MOC Pres-

idential Search Committee and to submit recommendations during the board's next meeting which is scheduled to be held in April in Palau.

Singeo also said that MOC Dean of Instruction Francis Matsutaro of Palau has been acting president since Dec. 31.

Capelle thanked Rengiil on behalf of the Board of Regents and the entire COM system, saying that he wants "to express (our) sincere and deep gratitude for the many years you so faithfully spent serving as President of the

Micronesian Occupational College. The Republic of Belau (Palau) will definitely gain from the experience that you possess and your keen sense of devotion to duty and responsibility.

"Congratulations and good luck as you assume a new dimension in service to your country," Capelle said, adding, "We pray that you and your family continue to enjoy God's blessings now and in the coming New Year."

COM Receives Land Deed

MOIONIA, Pohnpei—College of Micronesia Rector Alfred Capelle of the Marshall Islands promised to protect the legacies of Pohnpei in accepting here Jan. 20 the deed to 30.1 hectares or 75.25 acres of land in Palikir for the college, according to a COM press release.

The deed was presented during a reception by the Community College of Micronesia faculty and staff for the COM Board of Regents, who began their annual meeting here Jan. 19, at the Sunset View Bar, by Pohnpei Public Land Authority Chairman Heinrich Iriarte who urged the college to make use of the land to develop the young people of Micronesia.

The land is near the Palikir

The land is near the Palikir site for the proposed new Federated States of Micronesia capitol.

COM Executive Director Singeru Singeo said the land will be used to house the main COM campus, when funds are made available for its construction, and for the College of Tropical Agriculture and Science agricultural experiment station.

Agricultural research is permissible under the conditions of the deed which calls for college construction and operations within five years after the deed was executed to avoid its being reverted back to the state, Pohnpei

State Public Iand Authority Commissioner Yasuo I. Yamada said.

"The Board of Regents view this gift as one which carries with it the responsibility to protect the legacies of Pohnpe and its people," Capelle said during the ceremony.

"The board also views this gift as a sign of Pohnpei's permanent commitment to the college and its suitability to be given something of untold value," he said, adding, "We assure you that this decision will bring pride to you for a long time to come."

Gov. Resio Moses said that the event reflects the commitment of FSM state and national government leaders to supporting a unified COM system.

Pohnpei State Legislature Speaker Ambros Senda cited the legislature's support for the college in authorizing the land transfer and providing funds for construction and program assistance.

"The college stands before us as a unique opportunity to forge a more unified Micronesia," Sende said, adding that it also holds "a promise for a better tomorrow when illiteracy will be banished from our islands and our people will be vested with the skills and the motivation essential to the task of carrying our islands to true self-reliance.

Pohnpei Exec Branch reorganizes ROLONIA, Pohnpei—A bill to The Office of Federal and For-

Pohnpei—A bill KOLONIA, to abolish the State Department of Administration and assign Public Lands Authority under a new Department of Land in a new reorganization of Pohnpei State executive branch was signed into law on Jan. 22 by Gov. Resio S. Moses, according to the state Legislative Liaison Officer Heinrick Stevenson.

The new law which will accommodate the Pohnpoi State constitutional requirement of placing all policy-making boards, departments and agencies directors who are subject to governor's appointment and removal power directly under the governor's office, also renames Legal Affairs Department as Justice Department, Stevenson said.

The new law repeals section 5 of the state Uniform Appointments and Tenure Act of 1983 and empowers the governor to fill an ap-pointed position through an administrative directive in case of vacancies or temporary absences in excess of 60 days and commissions the Lt. Governor to serve as temporary administrative head of that office until a successor is appointed.

The bill, which was passed by the legislature during its December special session, also amends and repeals various existing laws and rescinds other administrative directives of the state govern-ment relating to executive branch structuring, Stevenson added.

The law also renames Community Services Department to Public Works Department which will include divisions of construction management, operations and main-tenance, public utilities and sea and air transportation under its supervision.

The law abolishes the Department of Administration and transfers its functions, except Personnel Office, to a new Department of Treasury; also creates additional offices of Budget, Planning and Statistics and Youth and Social Affairs.

The Department of Land will in-clude: Divisions of survey and mapping; management and administration of public lands which may not be implemented until the Legislature enacts a statute repealing D.L No. 4L-69-76 which esta-blished the Pohnpei Public Lands Authority; historic preservation, museum and cultural affairs, and parks and recreational facilities.

The new Department of Treasury will include divisions of trea-sury and public finance, revenue and taxation and procurement and supplies.

The Office of Federal and Foreign Relations retains its manover activities in interstate, national and international affairs, while activities related to youth, sports and recreation are assigned under the new Office of Youth and Social Affairs, Stevenson said, adding that the Public Affairs Office retains its activities in public information, legislative and Pohnpei government interbranch affairs.

The law also renames the Outer Islands Affairs Office as Island Affairs Office to include coordination of activities both in outer islands and Pohnpei Island

Personnel Office which was formerly under the department of Adminstration is now Office of Personnel, Labor, and Manpower Development with supervision of administration of executive branch personnel, labor and manpower de-velopment, while the new Office of BPS is charged with budget development and planning and sta-

Departments of Conservation, Resources and Surveillance, Education and Health Services were only affected minimally by reorganization law.

The transition section protects the officers whose departments and offices are renamed to be carried forward into the new organization without the necessity of renomination, Stevenson added.

Terminal completion in 1987 Naisali new

KOIONIA, Pohnpei-The Honolulu based Alfred A. Yee Division of Leo A. Daly architectural firm began April 24, 1985, a preliminary users' survey and currently concluding a state-of-the-art design for the \$1.2 million Pohnpei International Airport terminal, according to a Pohnpei state information office release.

Pohnpei State Gov. Resio Moses said "the new International Air Terminal Facility is vital to attract visitors, both tourists and investors, to Pohnpei. It is part of Pohnpei State's program to improve the Island's basic infrastructure. This program also includes completion of the is-land's circumferential road, a new power plant and a hydro-elec-tric dam to control the costs of power," a news release from Fawcett McDermott Cavanagh Brinck, Inc., a public relations firm in Honolulu, reported.

The architectural and engineering work will cost \$143,406 and is scheduled to be completed late January to make an April 1986 awarding of construction con-tracts possible, Pohnpei State Community Services Director Ber-nún Weilbacher said, adding, that the bid notices are going out in

The masterplan which provides for expansion to meet Pohnpei's air terminal needs for the next 20 years, is designed to accommodate the large planeside gatherings common on the islands in spacious, daylit, breezecooled modules; the terminal also provides for proper separation of restricted access areas from the public spaces.


"We incorporated the same naturally-occuring basalt crystals and clerestory lighting used by 13th century builders who con-structed the historic artificial island city of Nan Madol," Godfrey said.

Surveying and civil engineering of the project are being handled by Austin, Tsutsumi and Associ-

ates, Inc., of Honolulu.

The construction of the terminal facility, which is jointly funded by Pohnpei State Legisla-ture, the U.S. Federal Aviation Agency and a U.S. Congressional appropriation through the U.S. Interior Department, is scheduled to begin in 1986 and will take one year to complete, Leo A. Daly Project Manager Ed Pskowski said.

Founded in 1915, Leo A. Daly's recently completed projects in-clude remodeling and expansion of the United and Continental Airlines' Terminals at both Los Angeles and San Francisco International Airports and Western Airline Terminal also at Ios Angeles International Airport.

Head of SPEC

KOIONIA, Pohnpei—The appointment of Tuvalu Deputy Prime Minister and Finance Minister, the Hon. Henry Fati Naisali as the New Director of South Pacific Bureau for Economic Cooperation (SPEC) was announced on Jan. 16 a by the present Chairman of the South Pacific Forum, Cook Islands a Prime Minister Sir Thomas Davis, according to SPEC Acting Director Trevor Sofield in a Jan. 21 telex to FSM External Affairs Secretary Andon Amaraich.

Davis said that Naisali has the full confidence of the leaders of the 14-member governments of the South Pacific Forum who have se- 9 lected him for the position by consensus; adding, that Naisali's >

"sterling work in Tuvalu had not gone unnoticed in the region" and expressing the appreciation of all forum leaders for the generosity of the Tuvalu Prime Minister and government in releasing so valued a minister.

Naisali was born on Nukulaelae, Tuvalu, on Dec. 08, 1928. He attended the Elisefou School in Tuvalu, the Ratu Kadavulevu and Queen Victoria schools in Fiji, St. Andrews College in Christ-church, New Zealand, and studied at Canterbury University College, 1954-1956.

He joined the then Gilbert and Ellice Islands civil service in 1952, appointed Financial Secretary of Tuvalu in 1976, elected member of Parliament for Nukuallaelae and in 1981, during his second term, was appointed Minis-ter of Finance and Deputy Prime Minister, of which posts he held until his appointment.

Naisali, who is married with three children, has indicated that he expects to take up permanent residence in Suva, Fiji, on Feb. 7 and requested that Sofield act as director until he arrives.

Davis, when congratulating Naisali upon his appointment, also paid tribute to the outgoing di-rector Mahe Tupouniua, saying,

"Mr. Tupouniua (who concluded his term as director of SPEC on Jan. 13) has served the region and SPEC with great distinction. His devotion to duty was a by-word in the South Pacific and his contribution to the region was a very significant one."

Pohnpei State Legislature to trim spending

his administration is "to keep spending at the minimum level" so to provide direct benefits to the people, Pohnpei State Legislature Speaker Ambros Senda told the law makers in a prepared statement during the legislature session held on Jan. 20.

vehicles was made by the new officers during a Jan. 16 leader-ship meeting following legislature's reorganization on Jan. 13.

Senda said the move is being made to trim legislature's high operational costs and maintenance for the upkeep of these vehicles.

The committee decided that in the best interest of all concerned, three vehicles will be assigned to the executive branch and four others to be bid out to the public, special committee chairman Senator Feliciano Permen of Sokehs said.

"After thorough consideration of the many requests from the municipal offices who have indicated their interest in acquiring the vehicles, the special committee however decided that with the present conditions of the vehi-cles and the road conditions in the municipalities, it would be financially disadventagious to maintain and keep these vehicles municipalities," in the noted.

ment are actually needed for leg-islature's own use," Senda added. The remaining four vehicles will continue to be assigned to the offices of the Speaker, Legislative Counsel, Chief Clerk and the Administrative Offficer, Senda said, adding that contrary to previous practices, all vehicles formerly assigned to the chairmen of the standing committees are now being disposed off.

He said he is also putting a freeze on outside travels except ones absolutely necessary in an effort to keep the operational costs to a minimum. A new administrative arrangement to delegate legislature's daily administrative responsibilities to Vice Speaker Job Micah of Pingelap and public and press relations to Floor Leader Francis Simeon of Nett was also decided during the Jan. 16 meeting of the new of-

Senda said the current session is scheduled to be adjourned at the end of January and will be looking forward to its formal review of the Compact when the FSM national government transmits it.
