# \$8M Hydropower completed

KOLONIA, Pohnpei (FSM INFORMA-TION SERVICE) - Another and important symbolic link between the new country of the Federated States of Micronesia and the United States of America was forged Saturday in the hills of Nanpil, Nett, some two miles southeast of Kolonia, according to FSM Information Advisor Dr. John R. Rider.

Rider said that on that day, Oct. 24th, Pohnpei First Lady Susan Moses and Nett Municipality First Lady Agnes Iriarte representing Nahnalek, wife of Nanmwarki Fretrich Iriarte of Nett, closed the shears to cut the ribbon to officially open the Nanpil Hydropower Project to the general public.

will generate 4 The project million kilowatt hours annually to supply 20 percent of the island's energy needs, and will significantly reduce the need to import fuel oil to operate the present generators.

The project construction of the facility includes an intake structure near the present Kolonia water diversion dam, a 4,600foot-long concrete penstock entrenched under the access roadway, a powerhouse, switchyard and transmission lines. The powerhouse and switchyard are constructed on fastland near a deteriorated hydro plant built during the Japanese administration

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## Number 14 Reorganization bill passes first hurdle

KOIONIA, Pohnpei (FSM INFORMA-TION SERVICE) - The reorganization bill (CB 5-18) passed first reading on Oct. 8th, the 17th day of the second regular session of Fifth FSM Congress, but was defferred action on the second reading on the following day after the fifth Congress draft. Another bill to amend the FSM code to place extradition and transfer of prisoners within the scope of the joint law enforcement agreements also passed first reading.

## Bills passed up to 3rd week

The following three bills passed second reading:

C.B. 5-74, CD1, to amend the FSM code to authorize any trial justice of the national Courts to review a sentence he imposed on a prisoner, after said prisoner has served one-third of his sentence, and, in the case of any prisoner serving a life sentence, or a sentence of 30 or more years after he has served ten years of his sentence, for determining the eligibility for parole of said prisoner,

C.B. 5-121, CD1, to amend the FSM Code for extending the expiration date of the title, and

C.B. 5-146, to amend Public Law no. 4-101, which established the FSM Airline Corporation.

# Nakayama is BOG's VEEP

KOLONIA, Pohnpei (FSM INFORMA-TION SERVICE) - Former and first FSM President Tosiwo Nakayama of Truk was given a contract Oct. 1 as a consultant to the Bank of Guam with the title of Vice President for Governmental Affairs.

Nakayama, who was reached over the phone in Truk, said his office is located at the Truk branch of the bank and that the bank is a client of his.

Nakayama's job is "to maintain public relations for the bank" and act as a consultant to the Bank's President who is also the Chairman of the Bank's Board of Directors.

His consulting responsibilities cover the area of Marshall Islands, FSM and Palau and "including any place the Bank of Guam has branches in and any others the Bank President may assign," Nakayama said.

Bank of Guam presently has four Guam branches and branches in San Francisco, California; Majuro, Ebeye, Pohnpei, Truk, Rota, Saipan and Palau, a facility in Tinian and a representative office in Tokyo, said Pohnpei Branch Manager Vita Moors.

He also submits monthly reports to Bank President Jesus S. Leon Guerrero, Nakayama said, adding that "I can also do other consulting for others and welcome such job since I have my own consulting firm."

Nakayama said he is comfortable with the terms of his contract with the Bank and looks forward to a very interesting and rewarding time with the Bank and the Micronesian islands.

Nakayama, who has been in public service most of his adult life, "fais credited as the ther" of the FSM Government. He was the First President of the Federated States of Micronesia, who led the new nation to maturity and for eight years maintained unity among the diverse ethnic and cultural elements of the four FSM states and giving priority to creating an international personality by joining international organizations and entering regional agreements while guiding the new nation toward termination of the 1947 Trusteeship Agreement and the implementation of the Compact of Free Association with the United States of America on Nov. 3, 1986.

After having spent most of his adult life in government sector, Nakayama said he is "determined that henceforth he will channel his energies in the development of the private sector."

## **Gusmed represents FSM**

KOLONIA, Pohnpei (FSM INFORMA-TION SERVICE) - A cultural interchange by Pacific traditional artists was held at the South Pacific Commission (SPC) grounds at Anse Vata, Noumea, New Caledonia, on Oct. 10-14 in conjunction with the SPC 40th Anniversary celebrations and 27th South Pacific Conference.

Pacific islands artists from 19 SPC member countries participated in the art interchange at the SPC headquarters in Noumea, an SPC press release said.

John Gusmed of Yap was selected from among four FSM states candidates to represent the FSM in the interchange, Yap State Tourism Division Chief Michael Gaan said.

Gusmed, who specialized in story-board making, displayed a completed storyboard at the interchange and also exhibited his skills in completing an undone piece in the presence of high level government officials during the opening ceremonies of the 27th South Pacific Conference and the 40th anniversary celebrations.

Gusmed, who placed second in the finals, was asked to stay behind to do a sign for SPC.

The art interchange was funded by the Government of France thru SPC and was aimed to feature traditional methods of weaving, sculpture, and carving, the release said, noting that the affair is aimed at increasing the public awareness and interest in the Pacific arts and preservation and maintenance of its cultural identity.

SPC member country participants in the art interchange were: American Samoa, Cook Islands, FSM, Fiji, French Polynesia, Guam, Kiribati, Marshall Islands, New Caledonia, Niue, Commonwealth of Northern Mariana Islands, Palau, Solomon Islands, Tokelau, Tonga, Tuvalu, Vanuatu, Wallis and Futuna, and Western Samoa.

ties, and cross-cultural communication and minored in sociology and political science at Michigan State University; received his MME (Masters degree in Music Education) from Chicago Musical College in 1954, and his BA in speech and music from Indiana Central College in 1947.

## ECI to FM in January

KOLONIA, Pohnpei (FSM INFORMA-TION OFFICE) -The Federated Micronesia's of States postal code abbreviation will be changed from E.C.I. (Eastern Caroline Islands) for Kosrae, Pohnpei and Truk and W.C.I. (Western Caroline Islands) for Yap to FM beginning January 1, 1988, according to FSM Postmaster General Jim Miller.

The change is part of the move to standardize the postal code former abbreviations for the Trust Territory island groups to with the coding compatible be standards used by the United States federal government and the international agencies, Miller said.

Miller also said that the change will make it easier to sort mail for all concerned, and added that the proposed postal code abbreviations which were recommended by U.S. National Bureau of Standards are as follows: Federated States of Micronesia becomes FM; The Marshall Islands becomes MH; Palau becomes PW, while the Commonwealth of Northern Marianas will change from CM to MP.

In another postal service related activity, Miller announced that the U.S. Postal Service Board of Governors approved a postal rate increase to take effect in the summer of 1988.

As stated in the postal section of the Compact of Free Association, the postal rate between the United States and the FSM is the same as U.S. domestic postage, Miller said, adding that an increase in postal rate for packages and others with the U.S. service is anticipated in mail tandem with the approved increase in domestic postal service from 22 to 25 cents for First Class mail.

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# FSM National T3 center holds business course

KOLONIA, Pohnpei (FSM INFORMA-TION SERVICE) - The National  $T^3$ Training Center was the scene of a five-day course in Small Business from 26-30 of Oct., according to  $T^3$  Coordinator Henry Hickey.

The course, which has proven effective towards promoting increased employment and improved economics by creating opportunities through the establishment of small scale businesses in many of the developing countries of the South Pacific over the past years, was sponsored by the UNDP-/IIO and conducted by Dr. Geoffery G. Meredith, professor in Accounting and Financial Management at the University of New England in Armidale, N.S.W., Australia.

Hickey said the purpose of the course is to assist  $T^3$  graduates and others who are interested, in setting up their own small scale businesses.

The T<sup>3</sup> program turns our laborers with various levels of vocational skills; the Small Business course takes them one step further in their careers by preparing them to become independent managers and entrepreneurs, Hickey said.

The course was highlighted by a presentation by Messrs Leo Carpio and Ireneo Samuel of the FSM Development Bank Loan division on how the bank could assist them in securing loans to form their own businesses.

IIO's intention is to run the program in 1987 for one week in each of the three IIO Regional T<sup>3</sup> Training Centers in Pohnpei, Tonga and Vanuatu with a two-week follow up in 1988 and 1989 in each of the three centers, Hickey said, adding that a brief graduation ceremony was held at the Pohnpei center where FSM Congress Ways and Means Committee vice chairman Redley Killion of Truk addressed the participants and awarded them certificates of completion.

## Gov. survives impeachment attempt

MOEN, Truk (FSM INFORMATION SERVICE) - Truk State Governor Gideon Doone survived another impeachment attempt on Sept. 21, as Truk State Legislature failed to secure the Truk Charter required two-thirds or 19 votes to bring about procedures of impeachment against him.

Truk Legislature Resolution 3-134, which calls for impeachment of the governor for (certain) alleged misfeasance or malfeasance in office, was drafted and introduced by a special joint investigating committee comprised of members of the Committees on Federal and Foreign Affairs, Judiciary and Governmental Operations and Ways and Means.

The Legislature earlier failed to bring about the procedures of impeachment against the governor during a secret voting held on August 12 with 18 votes for, and one invalid eight against vote, before it recessed on August 13. The legislature then decided to reconsider the impeachment issue on Sept. 14 but postponed it to Sept. 21.

The Sept. 21 voting failed again to reach the required 19 votes by 1 with 18 votes for impeachment, 8 votes against with two members excused during the session.

Truk Charter gives the legislature the power of impeachment through resolution and states that "upon adoption of a resolution of impeachment of the governor...a notice of impeachment shall be forthwith served upon the chief justice of the district court by the chief clerk of the legislature. The chief justice shall thereupon call a session of the district court to meet within ten days after such notice to try the impeachment."

It is not known what other actions the Legislature might take next regarding the impeachment issue, but the senators went into another reorganization meeting after the voting and shuffled the chairmen of its committees including the positions for vice speaker and the floorleader.
